Habibi sees Australia as the land of opportunities and is grateful for every moment and each and every day he, and his family, are able to live, study and work in a safe environment.

Conditions of Entry



By submitting a nomination for the 2024 Apprentice Training Awards, you acknowledge and agree to comply with the following Conditions of Entry:

All Categories

- Entrants must meet all eligibility requirements for the award category they are nominated in.
- All nominations must be submitted online via the AwardForce portal through the provided link.
- Each award category has specific criteria that must be met before the submission will be considered valid. Failure to comply with the entry requirements may result in rejection by the Apprentice Training Awards team.
- The closing date for nominations in 11.59pm on Monday 12 August. No further nominations can or will be accepted after this date. Apprenticeship Employment network reserves the right to extend the deadline.
- By applying, all nominees, finalists and winners of the Apprentice Training Awards agree that any nonconfidential material or details from their nominations and provided photographs/videos may be used online, in broadcast and print media and in various publicity and promotional materials.
- All finalists must attend the Apprentice Training Awards Gala Dinner on Wednesday 20th November 2024.
- All finalists will be required to attend an online interview with the judging panel at times to be advised.
- It is the responsibility of the nominators and nominees to ensure they have selected the correct category to nominate in.
- All information provided must be factually correct.
- The Apprenticeship Employment Network reserves the right to reassign nominations lodged to incorrect categories at its discretion.
- Finalists and winners of the Apprentice Training Awards acknowledge they may be asked to participate in live or written interviews.
- Finalists and winners of the Apprentice Training Awards may be required to participate in speaking opportunities at future events held by the Apprenticeship Employment Network.

Individual Categories

- Nominees must be permanent residents of Australia
- Nominees must not be currently enrolled in school unless nominating for the school-based category
- Nominees must be enrolled as a Victorian apprentice or trainee from July 2023 and be a current or completed apprentice or trainee as at 20 November 2024.
- Nominees must be employed by a Group Training Organisation within Victoria who is a member of the AFN
- All nominees must submit a high-quality headshot as part of their nomination. Selfies and bathroom photos will not be accepted. School photos are accepted. We encourage you to submit multiple photos including those taken at your worksite while wearing uniform.
- Be registered in a training course that leads to a nationally recognised qualification relevant to the award you are nominating for.

Business Categories

- All nominees must be a registered Group Training Organisation within Victoria and a paying member of the AEN or Host Employer through a GTO member of the AEN.
- Nominees must provide accurate and up-to-date information regarding their operations, achievements, and contributions.
- Any false or misleading information may result in disqualification.
- Nominees agree to allow the AEN to use their organisation's name and logo in promotional materials related to the awards.

FAQ's



Can I nominate an Apprentice/Trainee if they have completed their qualification?

Yes, you can! If your Apprentice or Trainee has been enrolled and engaged in their studies/training within the 2024 calendar year, you can still nominate.

I nominated my Apprentice/Trainee for the 2024 Victorian Training Awards. Can I also nominate for the 2024 Apprentice Training Awards?

Yes, they are eligible! As long as your Apprentice or Trainee meets the eligibility criteria, we welcome your submission.

I have an outstanding Apprentice or Trainee in another state. Can I nominate them?

Unfortunately, no! The Apprentice Training Awards are open only to Victorian Apprentices and Trainees.

Do you have an award to recognise employees for their long service?

We sure do! Every year we present Industry Service Awards to staff who have reached 10, 15, 20. 25 and 30 year milestones.

Is it okay to provide an "on the job" photo instead of a headshot?

We welcome "on the job" photos as part of your nomination, but also require a headshot. Finalists will have their photo printed in the program booklet and displayed on screen at the presentation dinner.

Can I nominate an Apprentice/Trainee I have nominated in previous years?

Absolutely! If the Apprentice/Trainee has not previously won the category and meets the eligibility criteria, you can nominate them again.

I have a lot of worthy Apprentices and Trainees. How do I pick who to nominate?

Nominate them all! There are no limitations to the amount of submissions you can put through.

Can I nominate 1st and 2nd Year Apprentices and Trainees?

Of course! We encourage you to nominate any outstanding Apprentices and Trainees no matter how far into their training they are.

Can I nominate across multiple categories?

We encourage nominations across multiple categories as long as the Apprentice or Trainee is eligible. E.g. If nominating for Inspiration Award: Women in Trades, you can also nominate for Apprentice of the Year.

What should I include in my nomination?

Consider the points provided within in criterion. Address these points and provide as much detail as possible within the word limits.

Required Supporting Documentation



All nominations must be accompanied by supporting documentation to substantiate the claims made within the nomination. It is crucial that each nomination is backed by concrete, verifiable evidence to ensure a fair and thorough review process.

Without such supporting documentation, the nomination risks being incomplete and may be subject to rejection.

Tips



Nomination Tips

Read the Nominations Guide

Make sure you read the nominations guide carefully to ensure you have met all eligibility requirements and can address all criteria for the category you would like to enter.

Ask for help

Prepare a draft of your nomination and ask a friend, mentor, teacher or parent to read and make any suggestions.

Tell your story

Tell us about your achievements and how they relate to your studies and worklife.

Keep it simple

A good nomination doesn't have to be long. The best nominations tell the judges a story in simple words with supporting evidence.

Use evidence to support your story

Include documents, certificates and written references as part of your nomination. A good way to describe something with evidence is to tell the judges the actions you took to achieve something and the result of your actions.

Final checks

Don't forget to proofread the nomination yourself before submitting. You can also ask a friend, mentor, teacher or parent to help you proofread.

Don't forget to submit your nomination before closing date **12 August 2024**.

Writing Tips

Understand the criteria

Carefully review the criteria for your selected category and ensure you can address in it's entirety.

Gather information

Take time to reflect and gather information for your nomination. This may include speaking to your trainer, employer, mentor, etc.

Use an active voice

E.g. I have achieved great success during my apprenticeship due to...

Provide examples and evidence

Show evidence for what you write. You can include as part of your written criteria but don't forget you can (and should) upload documents too.

Word Limits

Take advantage of your full word limits. Each criterion has a minimum and maximum word limit.

Focus on Impact

Emphasise the positive outcomes and benefits of your training and employment.

Proofread and Edit

Review your nomination for grammar, spelling and factual accuracy before submitting.

DID YOU KNOW

Feedback from judges show that nominations can be overlooked if they don't immediately capture the reader's attention.

It is important to ensure your nomination is engaging and compelling from the start.

Judging Process



During this process, judges dedicate significant time and effort to thoroughly review each nominee's nomination. They assess the nominations using specific criteria tailored to the award standards and objectives. Judges assign scores of between 1-10 based on how well each nominee meets thee criteria, ensuring fair and comprehensive evaluation process.

Judging

Eligibility Evaluation

All nominations undergo evaluation by the Apprenticeship Employment Network and Board. The nomination's eligibility will be assessed based on the eligibility requirements and selection criteria to determine if it can proceed to the shortlisting stage.

Selection of Finalists

The shortlisting process typically takes approximately two weeks. Judging panels will score all nominations and determine which nominees will progress through to finalist interviews.

Finalist Interviews (Individual Categories Only)

Finalist Interviews will take place virtually. The selection criteria will be used as the basis for questions that will be asked at the interview.

Award Winners Determined

Once the interview process has been completed, the judging panel will determine the award winner for each category. Winners will be announced at the Apprentice Training Awards Gala Event on Wednesday 20th November 2024. All nominees will be notified as to the outcome of their nomination.

Judging Panel Composition

Each panel member has the relevant experience to evaluate their respective category. Panels typically include four members, with attention given to ensuring a balanced representation across all categories.

Scoring

10 - Exceptional

Demonstrated notable advancement beyond the selection criteria with extensive and compelling evidence.

9 - Outstanding

Exceeded the essential selection criteria with very significant evidence.

8 - Excellent

Fully met all selection criteria with comprehensive and thorough evidence.

7 - Very Good

Met all the selection criteria with strong and persuasive evidence.

6 - Good

Met a majority of the selection criteria with good supporting evidence.

5 - Satisfactory

Met a moderate number of the selection criteria with adequate evidence.

4 - Fair

Met some of the selection criteria with minimal evidence

3 - Poor

Met very few of the selection criteria with insufficient evidence.

2 - Inadequate

Did not meet any of the selection criteria and lacked evidence to support the nomination

1 - Unsatisfactory

Did not meet any of the selection criteria and no evidence supplied.
